



# Curriculum Overview

## Curriculum Area: Art and Design

Year: 10

### Curriculum covered

#### **Autumn Term**

The first GCSE project is an extended portfolio project. Using the initial theme (SEALIFE) students will firstly produce a mind map then research the style, construction methods, inspiration and motivations of different ceramicists and will draw using a range of different media, including pencil crayon, ink, chalk, and chalk pastel. We will also visit the Sealife Centre to fulfil the primary source drawing expectation. Pupils will then design, sample, create and evaluate work based on these investigations.

#### **Spring Term**

Pupils will study the style and construction methods of various wire sculptors. Pupils, based on their research, will create samples in wire before designing, experiment further, create and evaluate work.

Pupils then start work on their second portfolio project; this project demands more independence as students can choose their own theme and work in the medias of their choice. Pupils produce a mind map to ensure a great start to a well-considered project.

#### **Summer Term**

Pupils develop resources to work from, taking primary source photographs.

Pupils will draw in the media of their choice using their resources, photograph, and imagination as a starting point.

Pupils continue working on this project into Year 11.

### Internal Assessment

All work is assessed against four assessment objectives:

AO1: Contextual understanding

AO2: Exploring and Experimenting

AO3: Drawing and Recording

AO4: Personal response

When all the coursework is completed, we put together a portfolio of work to enter as the pupil's component 1; at this stage we are more selective about what is entered and select the best project plus elements of another project that support the mark given.

The externally set test is also assessed in school using the same assessment criteria and both this and the coursework marks are then checked by an external moderator who visits the school in June and inspects a range of the pupils' work.

### Exam Board/Exam Paper Requirements/% Weighting

#### Key dates (mocks and final exams)

We follow the AQA's Art and Design course.

Component 1 Portfolio: A portfolio that in total shows explicit coverage of the four assessment objectives. It must include a sustained project evidencing the journey from initial engagement to the realisation of intentions and a selection of further work undertaken during the student's course of study. Marked out of 96. 60% of the GCSE. Deadline Christmas in Year 11.

Component 2 Externally set test: Students respond to their chosen starting point from an externally set assignment paper relating to their subject title, evidencing coverage of all four assessment objectives. Preparatory period starts in January of Year 11. Concludes with a ten-hour final piece completed in late April/May under exam conditions. Marked out of 96%. 40% of GCSE.

The theme of the first project is Sealife, The Blue Planet BBC series is a fantastic resource and can be used to enrich the curriculum taught in school. We will watch aspects of it in class as it is visually stunning as well as being informative about the struggles facing the oceans.
